

Here are some other safe-sex tips for "girls who like girls," from Donna Minkowitz's article, "Safe and Sappho: An AIDS Primer for Lesbians":

- -- Don't allow anyone's menstrual blood to enter your body.



### IWU's Blue Moon



Dear Sub,


First of all, it's still Republican and winter here. People who get to live in San Francisco shouldn't complain. About anything. Period.



# Animal Magnetism

## Premarin: Menopause Drug Nightmare

As the "Baby Boomer" generation matures, and more and more women find themselves undergoing "the change of life," many will be advised by their doctors to take an estrogen replacement drug to alleviate menopausal symptoms [such as hot flashes; night sweats; painful sex and/or sexual intercourse, due to reduction in the production of natural vaginal lubricants; difficulty achieving orgasm, and loss of bone mass, or brittle bones — osteoporosis]. But the drug most commonly prescribed has at least one ugly side effect: cruelty.

That drug is Prèmarin@, an estrogen substitute extracted from the urine of pregnant mares. It is routinely prescribed for women who have had hysterectomies or are expecting menopausal symptoms, and also for post-menopausal women to prevent osteoporosis and heart disease. With an estimated eight million women currently taking the drug, and some 43,000,000 women entering menopause, the pregnant mare urine (PMU) industry is booming.

While this spells increased profits for Canadabased Ayerst Organics, Inc., the world's only producer of PMU, it also spells misery and death for hundreds of thousands of horses and foals.

### A mockery of motherhood

To produce the drug, mares are impregnated, then catheterized or fitted with a rubber collection cup attached to a hose. Because allowing mares out to pasture would mean losing some of their precious urine, they are forced to stand on concrete floors in stalls measuring just 8 feet long and 3 1/2 to 5 feet wide for most of their eleven month pregnancies.

For more than half the year — from September to April — the mares are unable to take more than a step in any direction, the narrowness of their stalls preventing even such simple movements as turning around, or lying down properly. Farmers who have leased their horses to PMU facilities report mares returning crippled or in poor health, and one former farmer documented several deaths on the Manitoba farm where he worked.

After giving birth, the mares are allowed only two months to pasture with their foals, during which time they are reimpregnated, then separated from their babies, and put back on the reproduction line.

### Fate of the foals

Like calves taken away from their "dairy cow" mothers to be raised for veal, the mares' foals are merely a "by-product" of PMU production.

Some are killed immediately, others are kept as replacements for worn-out mares or to expand production; the majority are sold out when they are about four months old, and sent to feedlots to be fattened, and then slaughtered.

### Neigh-sayers speak out

The cruelty of the PMU industry has caused an outcry from North Americans, including animal-rights activists and women's groups. Problems with the manufacturing process, especially the disposal of its foul-smelling waste products, worry Canadian environmentalists and legislators. Proposed expansion at Ayerst's Manitoba production facility threatens to overwhelm an already taxed sewage treatment system. In addition, according to Marianne Cerilli, member of the Legislative Assembly and

Environment Critic for the Canadian New Democratic Party, the expansion has "serious consequences for the Assinboine River, a river that many Manitobans use as a drinking water source."

Hormone therapy itself is coming under increasing scrutiny because of possible health risks. Studies have shown that women on hormone replacement drugs have increased risk of gall bladder disease and endometrial and breast cancers and suffer a range of side effects, such as water retention, cramps, and headaches.

Since synthetic estrogen can now be manufactured inexpensively, collecting PMU is an antiquated method of producing estrogen. PMU is the only menopause drug still made with animal-derived estrogen, and other synthetic estrogens, such as Estradiol Transdermal System, Estradiol tablets, Estropiate, and Estrone, are equally effective.

In response to animal protectionists, who were successful in shutting down the PMU industry in Ontario during the 1970's, the industry devised a Recommended Code of Practice, which outlines basic care for horses used for urine production. However this code merely contains recommendations -- no farmer is required to follow them -- and even these basic standards are so weak they fail to provide horses with even minimal protection.

### A growing industry

In 1993, an estimated 75,000 mares on 485 farms throughout Canada and North Dakota were confined for urine collection, giving birth to as many as 90,000 foals -- and the number may triple in the next few years if women continue to want non-synthetic treatments. Already, another 1,200 farms have applied to produce PMU, for which they are paid up to \$17 a gallon. Ayerst is preparing for a \$100 million expansion of its facilities in Manitoba with the aid of \$20 million from the Canadian Government.

### What you can do

- -- Write a simple letter to a health/women's magazine and your local paper explaining how mare's urine is acquired and that there are safe synthetics [estrogen-replacement drugs] available.
- -- because of the possible health risks associated with hormone replacement, women who are candidates for this therapy may want to investigate natural alternatives. Osteoporosis and heart disease can be prevented with a low-fat vegan (no animal products) diet, and milder, less potent plant forms of estrogen exist naturally in such foods as tofu, berries, and citrus fruits. Those who opt for hormone replacement therapy can ask their doctors to prescribe one of the synthetic estrogens.

### A natural approach to hormone shifts

Many physicians now treat menopause like a disease and prescribe hormone replacement therapy for menopausal women.

There is a better approach. Hormonal shifts at any life stage, including menopause, are much less intense on a low-fat, high-fiber diet. High-fat diets that increase estrogen production before menopause [take women on] a roller coaster ride. This [hormonal fluctuation] is aggravated by the lack of fiber in most high-fat diets. The body gets rid of excess estrogens by pulling them out of the blood and sending them into the digestive tract, where fiber carries them away with the wastes. Since animal products contain no fiber at all, a meat-eater's digestive tract does not contain enough fiber to carry waste hormones away effectively. They end up reabsorbing their own waste hormones.

Low-fat, high-fiber diets decrease estrogen production, both before and after menopause, and the net effect appears to be a much smoother change. The key, though, is not just to eliminate animal products, but also to keep vegetable oils to an absolute minimum.

Osteoporosis is one of the main reasons doctors prescribe estrogen replacement, but it now appears that the principal contributors to osteoporosis are animal proteins -- which leach calcium from the bones -- [along with other risk factors, such as] a sedentary lifestyle with a lack of weight-bearing exercise, alcohol, and tobacco [usel.

A low-fat, vegan diet is ideal: high in fiber, low in fat, and no animal protein. It provides calcium in the form of green vegetables, beans, peas, and lentils, or, if you prefer, fortified orange juice. Add daily exercise, and you've filled your own prescription for a healthful lifestyle.

### Synthetics preferable to Premarin

After learning how Premarin is produced, I stopped prescribing the drug for my patients undergoing estrogen therapy (ERT) for menopause-related symptoms. In my experience, plant-derived synthetic ERT drugs are preferable to Premarin, and they do not contain the hidden ingredient of cruelty. The 100% plant-derived synthetic I prescribe works just as well as Premarin. It contains 17-Beta Estradiol, the natural estrogen that human females produce.

Premarin's estrogen, made from pregnant mare's urine, is not the same as that in humans. And, like all animal-derived products, it shares the possible problem of inconsistency, while





synthetics, produced in sterile, laboratory conditions, leave nothing to chance. Their ingredients are constant, always in the same concentration, and without the impurities contained in animal waste.

In some markets synthetics can be more expensive, but wholesale prices of the most common synthetic estrogen and Premarin are virtually identical. And as more doctors prescribe synthetics, these drugs can compete on an equal footing.

It is my hope that we can move toward relying solely on ERT drugs that are not made from pregnant mare urine. To do this, we must speak up and demand the alternatives. Many doctors and patients do not know how Premarin is made and, upon learning the facts, are disgusted. It is our job to help them make a truly informed choice, and to send the producers of Premarin the message that deriving estrogen from horse urine is inhumane and unnecessary for human health. Please, choose not to take Premarin.

### Our suppliers adopt no-BGH policy

In November, after the FDA approved the use of B[ovine] G[rowth] H[ormone] in the production of dairy products -- and consented for the products to be sold without labelling, starting in February, 1994, many concerns were raised. Consumers not only questioned whether the BGH residues in milk would have some [adverse] effect on consumers' health, but also worried about the impact the growth hormone would have on the health of dairy herds and the financial stability of small dairy farmers.

Two of our major suppliers have adopted policies stating they will not knowingly carry products that have been produced with the use of BCH

Common Ground's position is that dairy products produced with BGH should not be offered for sale to the public unless they are labeled as such, so that consumers may choose whether or not to purchase such products.

This is a complicated issue, due largely to the fact that the dairy industry does not have a way of separating or tracking BGH and non-BGH milk. In addition, there is no test available to check for its use since it does not always show up in the milk itself.

Of the dairy products we now carry, the following are stated to be BGH-free: North Farm cheeses, Alta Dena yogurt and ice cream, and Nancy's yogurt.

We will strive to keep you informed on this issue.

The (FDA) has also refused to require labeling of milk and other dairy products derived from the use of the genetically engineered hormone, even though more than 90% of consumers favor labeling of rBGH products so they can avoid buying them.

### **Increased Animal Cruelty**

rBGH will cause suffering to millions of animals:

rBGH is like "crack" for cows. It "revs" their system and forces them to produce a lot more milk -- but it also makes them sick.

Even the FDA admits that cows injected with rBGH could suffer from increased udder infections (mastitis), severe reproductive problems, foot and leg ailments, and persistent sores and lacerations.

Thousands of Family Dairy Farmers will lose their farms

rBGH will bankrupt family farmers:

The overproduction of milk caused by rBGH could force up to 30% of U. S. dairy farmers out of business within 36 months after rBGH is introduced into the market. For each family farmer driven out of business, 25 other dairy-related jobs could also be lost.

### You and your family are at risk

rBGH milk can make you sick

The FDA admits that the use of rBGH in cows may lead to increased amounts of pus and bacteria in milk.

Equally disturbing, the powerful anti-biotics and other drugs used to fight increased disease in rBGH-injected cows may lead to greater antibiotic and chemical contamination of milk and dangerous resistance to antibiotics in the human population.

The FDA has released studies showing theat milk from rBGH-treated cows could have more saturated fat and less protein than regular milk.

Both the U. S. G(eneral) A(ccounting) O(ffice) and the Consumers' Union, publisher of Consumer reports magazine, have warned of the potential hazards to human health caused by consuming products derived from rBGH treated cows.

- -- Make a donation to your local Pure Food Campaign. Your funds will be used to alert other consumers to the dangers of genetically engineered hormones in their milk and dairy products.

# 101 Reasons/Vegetarian Finale

Are you still eating meat?! Gosh I hope not. Well, we'll give you one last chance, and print the fifth and final part of our continuing segment on "101 Reasons Why I'm a Vegetarian." Personally, one reason is enough. Like it says on my favorite t-shirt, "Meat Stinks". I think that pretty much sums it up.

- 80. In a March 1984 cover story. *Time* magazine reported the latest findings regarding cholesterol and heart disease. They noted that "in regions where...meat is scarce, cardiovascular disease is unknown."
- 81. There are no laws to regulate transport of animals for food consumption, specifically via truck. So this is the meat industry's preferred method of transport. That many of the animals are dead after their brutal trip is calculated as a cost of doing business.
- 82. Spinach grown on an acre of land can yield 26 times more protein than beef produced on the same acre.
- 83. The American farmer, as our storybook image of him suggests, simply no longer exists. Today, the person who actually gets close to farm animals is just a hired hand of agribusiness. In the broiler or layer shed of tens of thousands of birds, for instance, the main job to attend to is culling dead birds from cages. Through careful calculation, conditions are maintained intense enough to keep costs down, but not so intense that mortality rates cut into profits.
- 84. Today's pigs may be fed on their own excrement. Feedlot cattle are fed sawdust, newspapers, poultry litter, and industrial sewage. According to the USDA, cement dust may become a feed additive in the future because it produces a 30% faster weight gain than regular feed.

- 85. No law in the U.S. requires seafood inspection. The Food and Drug Administration is, for the most part, the only regulator over the fishing industry at all. Only 1,604 fish were checked by the FDA in 1989.
- 86. Human beings have no sharp pointed front teeth to tear flesh as do carnivores; humans have flat back teeth to grind (plant) food unlike carnivores.
- 87. The positive health benefits a person may think they get from eating fish, can better be achieved through a vegetarian diet. And then, fish lacks carbohydrates, fiber, and vitamin C. Fish is high in animal protein, which is hard on the kidneys, and high in fat, which increases the risk or cancer and gall bladder disease.
- 88. The USDA does not inspect for trichinosis in pork, and it is widely known that pork must be thoroughly cooked before eating. Still, about 4% of Americans have trichinella worms in their muscles which periodically cause flu-like symptoms.
- 89. Hens are starved for 30 hours before their slaughter. Any food given during this time would not be converted into flesh.
- 90. According to William Castelli, M.D., Director of The Framingham Heart Study, vegetarians outlive other people by about six years.
- 91. That vegetarians more than any other group need to worry about deficiencies of vitamin B-12 is not fully determined. Deficiencies are serious. However, the amount of the vitamin one needs to avoid deficiency is very small, and the body's supplies can last for many years. That a person is not able to absorb vitamin B-12 (for reasons not yet clear) is more to the root of the problem than getting enough vitamin B-12 form our food sources. Wakame and kombu (2 types of

seaweed) have been found to contain amounts of vitamin B-12 in excess to that in beef liver.


- 92. According to the United Nations, "slight, moderate or severe desertification: affects 29% of the earth's landmass. The destruction is largely due to the demands of livestock raising around the world. With two-thirds of the earth's population subsisting primarily on a vegetarian diet, it is the meat-eating rich countries, such as the U.S., that are driving this trend with their imports on beef. To supply demand, Third World exporters drive indigenous populations, who had tilled the soil sustainabley for generations, off their land. The uprooted rural refugees are currently flooding overburdened urban centers all around the world.
- 93. The U.S. is the only completely industrialized country to still allow the implantation of hormones into beef cattle today. Because of the routine feeding of antibiotics to livestock, European countries have banned nearly all imports of American beef.
- 94. Aside from the prospect of certain species of fish becoming extinct from overfishing, demand for ocean fish contributes to the over 200 thousand needless deaths of marine mammals and birds caught in fishing nets per year.
- 95. What doctors learn in school centers largely on how to treat disease with drugs and surgery. Today's physician probably had little more than a 3-hour seminar on nutrition during his or her entire time in medical school. And then, the extraordinary health benefits of a vegetarian diet probably were hardly mentioned.
- 96. Chickens hung on conveyor belts destined for their demise move past inspectors so fast that disease detection is virtually impossible in today's slaughterhouse. Ninety-one birds a minute whiz past USDA inspectors who are voicing concern over recently speeded up production lines, which they say are allowing

unsafe poultry to get the USDA's stamp of approval.

- 97. To produce foie gras, a duck or goose is force-fed huge quantities of grain three times a day with a feeder tube. This painful process goes on for 28 days before slaughter, causing stomachs sometimes to burst. Livers, diseased and swelled to several times normal size by this process, are a delicacy which sells for about \$12 an ounce. About 8,000 tons are produced worldwide per year.
- 98. Though milk gives temporary relief to ulcer sufferers because of the calcium content, acid production in the stomach eventually results and the stomach lining is eroded even more.
- 99. The direct and hidden costs of soil erosion and runoff in the U.S., mostly attributable to cattle and feed crop prodution, is estimated at \$44 billion a year. Each pound of feedlot beef can be equate with 35 pounds of eroded topsoil.
- 100. In 1983, the cost to the U.S. from heart attacks, in the way of medical bills, lost wages and productivity amounted to \$60 billion, according to the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute.
- 101. The treatment of human disease with antibiotics is showing signs of being hampered by the flagrant overuse of antibiotics injected into the animals people eat. People are becoming immune to medicinal drugs just by eating hamburgers and chicken. It is predicted that we are about to embark upon a preantibiotic era.

Tennessee movie fan Deborah Birdwell is suing a Cookeville theater that refused to let her bring her own chair into the theater. The 360-pound Birdwell says that the movie seats were too small for her (a familiar plaint of many supersized adults), but she was not allowed to sit in her own folding chair. As a result, the humiliated moviegoer is suing the theater for \$1.5 million, citing the Americans With Disabilities Act as legal back-up. ## **Episiotomy: American Female Genital Mutilation**

[An] Episiotomy is a cut made with scissors at the lower end of the vagina -- a slice made through the skin and underlying muscle to enlarge the birth opening. It is the Western form of [female] genital mutilation.

Take a survey among your women friends who have given birth in a Bloomington-Normal hospital, and ask if they have had an episiotomy. You will probably find that all of them (except for those who received a cesarean section) will answer "Yes." If you ask them why they needed one, they will probably tell you that that the doctor said it was necessary -- for a variety of medical reasons.

### Doctor doesn't always know best

According to a study done by Enkin, Keirse, and Chalmers, physicians gave the following reasons for their frequent use of episiotomies: First, an episiotomy substitutes a straight incision for a tear. Physicians claim the incision is easier to repair, better for healing, and prevents damage to the anus and rectum from deep tears (called third- and fourth- degree lacerations). Second, they claim an episiotomy prevents "serious damage to the muscles of the pelvic floor." However, after reviewing international medical literature, respective to use of episiotomies, the authors found no research to justify any such claims. In fact, the liberal use of episiotomy is associated with higher overall rates of perineal trauma (the perineum is the area located between the vagina and the anus).

Thorp and Bowles, after surveying 25 studies of over 89,000 women, concluded that women with episiotomies have five times as many serious tears as women who didn't receive episiotomies. They concluded that routine episiotomies are not justified by the evidence, and "may well increase the incidence of third-and fourth- degree lacerations." (Korte and Scaer, A Good Birth -- A Safe Birth, Harvard Common Press, 1992).

With 2 out of 3 first time mothers receiving episiotomies in the Netherlands, and 9 out of 10 first time mothers receiving them in the United States, we can draw one of two possible conclusions:

- 1) Women in the Netherlands have different types of perineums than do American women, or
- 2) Routine epsiotomies seem to be some type of fad in the American medical community.

Hmmm... which of the two possibilities is more plausible? Personally, I go for the "I need to have to do at the birth" medical fad theory. Doctors need to do something to feel needed and to employ all their surgical training. But then again, I know that there is probably not a single doctor in this town who has ever seen a natural childbirth from start to finish: sitting with a woman throughout her entire labor and delivery, with no medical intervention whatsoever. Not having witnessed completely natural childbirth gives doctors a twisted perspective on birth and the need for surgical interventions in otherwise normal labor and delivery.

### While we're at it, how about a face lift or breast augmentation, too?

One woman in town was recently told by her doctor (whom she fired after the appointment that I am about narrate) that she didn't have to have an episiotomy . . . but she'd be back soon asking for surgery to tighten her up so her husband could feel something during sex. This is a lie. It will not make a woman "too loose" if she foregoes an episiotomy. (Many doctors take an extra stitch or two when they sew up a woman's episiotomic incision after her delivery -- doctors commonly refer to these extra stitches as the "husband's stitch.) There are, for example, floor exercises that a woman can do, called "Kegels," which help prepare her pelvic floor for birth, and will also help to tighten everything back up after delivery.

To find this muscle, men and women, when you are peeing, cut off your urine in midstream. This motion is called a "Kegel," and it is what you should do to prepare for birth, and to one your vaginal muscles after delivery. One friend of mine, who has given birth 7 times (all natural births, and 5 of them at home) says that this notion of using episiotomy to preserve the pelvic floor for the man's pleasure is ridiculous. She also says that her husband has "no complaints," even though they have 7 kids.

Birth without an episiotomy will not cause trauma to a baby's head or cause brain damage, as another friend was told by a different area doctor (boy, some of the M. D. s around here are real winners . . . ). The baby's head is designed in such a way so as to mold as it passes through the birth canal. This design accounts for the two soft spots on the baby's head -- one on the crown and another at the back of the skull.

These soft spots allow for the head to move around more freely as the baby pushes through the birth canal. And this is why my daughter, Hannah, looked just like a baby conehead after birth! She's definitely intelligent (too much so at times, if you ask me) and has not been damaged by my refusing an episiotomy prior to her birth. There is no evidence to support medical claims that women who do not have episiotomies will risk brain damage in their babies.

### Could we hurry it up here? I'm scheduled to tee-off at 2:00 p. m.

Yes, an incision is easier to repair, but we're talking about the *doctor's convenience*, and not the birthing mother's. An episiotomy doesn't even aid the mother's healing, in most cases. For example, if you didn't tear at all, or had a second or third degree episiotomy that the doctor stitched up, which do you think would be more comfortable? Obviously, avoiding any unnecessary trauma to the tissue would be preferable.

Another friend of mine went into labor when her doctor was out of town. She ended up with the physician on call at a hospital in Chicago. She received a fourth-degree episiotomy from this doctor (which means she was cut through her sphincter muscle and into her anus) for no justifiable reason. Two years after her episiotomy, intercourse is still painful. She will probably need surgery again if she wants to have pain-free intercourse.

## A helpful hint you're not likely to find in *The Pantagraph*'s "Good Neighbors" column

To understand how an episiotomy can lead to serious laceration, try this experiment at home: Take a piece of fabric and try tearing it with a gentle tug — this piece of fabric would be much like a woman's perineum before episiotomy. Now make a small cut in the fabric, and tug again. Notice how easily it tears? This second tear mimics what frequently happens once a woman has an episiotomy . . . the tissue, weakened already from an earlier surgical incision, tears further. Consequently, the tissue will tear more at the site of the cut. If she doesn't have an episiotomy, however, then her body will tear only as much as is necessary — and it may very well not tear at all.

Yvonne Cryns, President of the Illinois Alliance of Midwives and a homebirth midwife, recently wrote to me that out of the 130 births she has attended, she has only seen episiotomies done, and those two she thinks were unnecessary. She says that in her practice, she has seen nothing deeper than a second-degree tear, because the tissue knows best how the tissue will stretch.

Usually, in suturing, the practitioner is looking at the tissue and trying to decided what it should look like and how the incised tissues should go together, which leads to painful healing along the stitched incisions. Many midwives have found in their practices that suturing is completely unnecessary in first and second degree lacerations, and if the woman will make a point of practicing sitting with her legs close together for the next few weeks after delivery, she will give her tissue a chance to heal properly, and on its own.

### But let's not throw the baby out with the bathwater (so to speak)

I must say that there are instances when episiotomies do prove medically necessary. For example, if there is severe foetal distress, and the baby must get out immediately, an episiotomy can save the baby's life. However, when healthy women give drug free births where they are allowed to move at will, birth in any position they want, and are allowed to eat light foods and drink juices throughout their labor, their need for an episiotomy proves extremely unlikely. However, there are exceptions to every rule.

Your job is to become an educated consumer. You probably wouldn't walk into a car lot and buy the first car that looked nice. Instead, you would probably research many cars prior to making an investment in one. It is even more important to do the same with finding the person to help you have your baby. Remember: cars will come and go, but you get only one chance at a safe birth for yourself and your child.

Things to do to avoid an episiotomy or other interventions (short of having a home birth):

1) Buy A Good Birth, A Safe Birth, by Diane Korte and Roberta Scaer, as soon as you find out you're pregnant. Read their book before you choose the person you want to help you deliver your baby. Even though you may have gone to the same ob/gyn for years that doesn't that s/he will give you the birth experience you want! A Good Birth, A Safe Birth will help you decide what you want, and help you interview doctors and midwives. If you are on Public Aid and have a medical card, you're not going to have a choice as to which practitioner you can go. However, if you're strong and have support, you can still refuse whatever you want. Remember: the doctor is there to serve you. You aren't there to please him/her.





- 2) Write a birth plan of what you want, including no episiotomy. Have the doctor sign this document, give him/her a copy, keep a copy for yourself, and have another copy put on file for you at the hospital. This document is your "guarantee" that you'll have the birth experience you want.
- 3) Do prenatal perineal massage exercises if you're a first-time mom. You can find out how to do these exercises from *Special Delivery*, by Rahima Baldwin, or request instructions on how do prenatal perineal massage exercises from one of the independent natural childbirth educators in the this community (those not affiliated with local hospitals). These exercises will help soften and stretch the perineal tissue before you go into labor, and make it easier for them to stretch during the birth.
- 4) Have someone other than your partner go with you to your birth to act as your advocate; this person should understand your wishes and support you in your demand for the kind of childbirth you want. One friend who didn't want an episiotomy (even though her practitioner agreed) ended up having one anyway, because her doctor kept saying "It will get the baby out faster if you let me [do an episiotomy]!" Such claims are not necessarily true. Had she had a birth advocate there to support her, her advocate would have encouraged her to forego the episiotomy and have the childbirth experience she wanted to have.
- 5) Move around throughout labor! Give birth in a position other than lying on you back or semi-reclined. Upright positions are best -- a

supported stand, full-squat, semi-squat, kneeling, or anything else you can come up with. Lying on your side with your top leg supported is another good position. Just remember to keep off your back!

You will most likely only go through this experience a few times -- or perhaps just once -- in your life. Make it count, do it right, and be safe!!! By not blindly trusting the medical community, and instead becoming an educated medical consumer, the lives you protect will be yours and your baby's!



# News From Voice

#### **BISHOP MYERS ASSAULTS WOMEN**

Catholic Bishop John Myers recently issued an edict prohibiting Catholic hospitals in the Peoria Diocese from prescribing ethynil estradiol (the morning after pill) to sexual assault victims. The Bishops assault on women is the most recent attack on women's rights by the Catholic Church. The Bishop "ruled that this drug" has "qualities" that cause abortion. Hey is this guy a genius or what? Where has he been hiding? Maybe under a funny hat and a big robe?

The Bishop further stated that "It was a tough decision, but the life of the unborn is the most important consideration." We at Voice for Choice vehemently disagree with the Bishop. In our opinion, this edict amounts to nothing less than another sexual assault against the survivor of a rape. The Catholic Church's attempt to exert unwanted, unauthorized control over a woman's body is completely unacceptable. Please let the Pantagraph and Bishop Myers hear from you.

### ANTI-CHOICER CONVICTED OF MURDER

Michael F. Griffin, 32, was convicted of first-degree murder and sentenced to life in prison for shooting Dr. David Gunn on March 10, 1993. The jury deliberated for less than three hours before convicting Griffin. Griffin will be eligible for parole in 25 years.

Gunn was the first doctor (not the last) slain as a result of violence against U.S. abortion clinics and their staff. Arson, bombings, chemical attacks and break-ins have been reported at clinics nationwide and at increasing rates.

During closing arguments Assistant States Attorney James Maori called Griffin an "assassin." "This is not a case about abortion,"Maori told the jury. "Michael Griffin walked up and assassinated Dr. David Gunn."

Maori read from a letter Griffin sent to other pro-life activists from jail that said if one baby is saved, it would be worth losing his life. "This is an assassin talking. This is an assassin bragging about what he did." Maori said.

Defense lawyer Robert Kerrigan complained to the jury that Maori used "careless language" by calling Griffin an assassin.

Kerrigan said Griffin was neither the mastermind of a plot to kill Gunn nor the triggerman. He conceded it was difficult to question testimony by police officers who said Griffin confessed immediately after the shooting, but suggested his client may have admitted to the crime to protect others.

Griffin did not testify during the two-week trial. His lawyers wanted to use an insanity defense, but Judge Parnham refused to allow it because Griffin had refused to be examined by a prosecution psychologist and the defense had planned to call no mental health experts of its own. The judge said expert testimony is required for an insanity defense.

Defense lawyers had contended that anti-choice videos, literature and rhetoric had driven Griffin temporarily insane.

#### **LEGISLATIVE NEWS**

Congress is expected to act on several bills and issues central to the pro-choice cause. The Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act has already passed both houses of Congress, and the Senate and House versions of the bill must be reconciled in conference -- a process that is not expected to take very long. We may see this bill come to the floor of both houses for final passage sometime in March.

Constituent pressure may be needed to move the Title X legislation to the Senate floor and see that it is passed without damaging amendments.

Last year's improvements to the Hyde Amendment -- which now requires all states to provide Medicaid funding for abortions in cases of rape or incest - could also prove vulnerable in this legislative session. Several states are still refusing to comply with the new funding mandate, and they (and anti-choice pressure groups) may try to push Congress into letting states decide whether to pay for abortion in these

In Illinois, clinic access legislation has been introduced. The bill would make it a crime to block access to health practices. The bill specifically exempts labor disputes from the bill. If you would like a copy of the bill send a SASE

Two parental notification bills have been introduced by anti-choice factions in the house and senate. Senate leader Pate Phillips (you know, the guy whose aid referred to Dawn Clark Netsch as a broad) has introduced a "shell bill" the bill currently has only one sentence in it. What this means is that the anti-choicers are free to fill it in later in the session.

HB3638 is another parental notification bill that will make it very difficult for teens to obtain an abortion. Please contact your legislators and let them know that, as nice as it would be if every

child could tell their parents about a pregnancy, it ain't so. Family communication and stability cannot be legislated, to do so places teens lives at risk.

### RICO LAWS MAY BE APPLIED TO PROTESTORS

In a victory for pro-choice activists, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that racketeering laws may be used to sue protesters who block women's access to abortion clinics. The ruling threatens Operation Rescue and other anti-choice groups with financial ruin.

### MY BODY, MY CHOICE.



The decision, while focused only on interpreting a federal law, is a big victory for the National Organization for Women, which took the case to the high court, and for the Clinton administration.


Wendy Wright, a spokesperson for Operation Rescue, called the decision "a complete travesty of justice." The Supreme Court Justices obviously do not understand how far-reaching this case is.

"This opens the floodgates for RICO to be used against anybody who uses free speech in a way that offends somebody else, or freedom of religious or freedom of assemble. Honsetly, where do these people come up with this stuff? Since when is chaining yourself to the front door of a business considered a freedom of religion issue? Isn't it normally considered trespassing? It certainly is when animal rights groups, feminists, environmentalists and civil rights activists have done it.

The ruling falls short of resolving all legal issues surrounding anti-choice activities. Shortly before this ruling the high court agreed to clarify -- sometime by July -- how far courts and local governments may go in restricting protesters outside of clinics.

### **HEALTH NEWS**

As the issue of health care reform is being debated in the nation's capitol we encourage our supporters to learn as much as possible about all of the bills being proposed. We believe that few plans are truly concerned with the health care of women. Take for example the Cooper-Grandy bill. This bill is being touted as the preferred plan to the President's. Unfortunately for women this bill is being pushed, it has bipartisan support and it doesn't cover pap smears, mammograms, and a host of other health care services related to women. We must be very careful in evaluating what is offered and whether or not it adequately covers anyone other than white males.





# For Choice

The abortion pill RU-486 will be available in Britain to Americans and other nonresidents. Under guidelines set by Britain's Health Department, they must pay \$500, prove they are less than nine weeks pregnant, obtain approval of two doctors at Marie Stopes International -- the London clinic providing the pill -- and stay long enough in Britain for a follow-up exam a week after the embryo is aborted. The woman's regular doctor must be informed also.

Frances Perrow, spokeswoman for Marie Stopes, said yesterday that the department agreed not to prosecute doctors or the nonresident patients if these conditions are met. The procedure takes "the best part of two weeks," she said. The cost and conditions are similar for residents.

Dominique Baldy of the Health Department said Britain still bans dispensing the drug to nonresidents, but is prepared to apply a broad definition of residency when it comes to RU-486. "The basic idea is that they should be here long enough to be sure they are healthy after receiving treatment," Baldy said.

RU-486 is not licensed for use in the U.S. to induce abortions, but President Clinton has called for more research into the drug.

In November, the FDA approved clinical tests of RU-486 in California to treat women with advanced breast cancer. Those trials are being conducted at the Breast Center and Cancer Institute at Long Beach Memorial Medical Center.

The German pharmaceutical company which holds the drug's patent, has been reluctant to release it to American companies, partly fearing a boycott of its products by anti-choice groups. "We hope making the drug available to American women here will in turn put pressure on the U.S. to allow the drug to be used there.

The drug was made available in Britain in 1991, but has not been widely used probably because women prefer the speed of a surgical abortion, Perrow said. Only about 6% of the 22,000 women who have abortions each year through Marie Stopes clinics choose RU-486, she said.

RU-486 works by blocking the action of progesterone, a natural steroid hormone essential for maintaining pregnancy.

Researchers have found a handful of children nationwide who developed serious digestive problems after being breast -fed by mothers with silicone implants. The implants appear to be to blame, but studies of large numbers of children are needed to know how rare the cases are, researchers said in the Journal of The American Medical Association.

For now, women with implants should continue breast-feeding, said a journal editorial by a children's digestive specialist not involved with the work.

Doctors who don't ask patients about their sex life are missing an opportunity to educate them on AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases, says the Centers of Disease Control. "Doctors need to be able to discuss these issues and counsel their patients," said Sandy Kerr, a CDC researcher.

The center, which is headed by Dr. David Satcher, the first Black director in that position, asked 2,545 doctors what they ask a new adult patient. The study showed that 49 percent of doctors ask about sexually transmitted diseases, while 31 percent ask about condom use.

Another 27 percent of doctors ask patients about their sexual orientation. The American Medical Association urges doctors to take sexual histories and counsel high-risk people about AIDS.

According to the latest research in the Archives of Internal Medicine, people over 50 aren't paying attention to messages about AIDS.

A study by researchers at the University of California in San Francisco found that people over 50 think they won't be infected with the virus. In a study for the AIDS virus and six times less likely to use condoms than people in their 20's.

In addition, the data showed 10 percent of AIDS cases are found in the 50-and-over age bracket annually and the highest rate of AIDS transmission is found in that age group.

#### **NEWS FROM THE FRONT**

A Pat Robertson organization called the American Center for Law and Justice is expanding its campaign to inject religious indoctrination into public schools. Threatening letters have been mailed to every school district in America warning that "SWAT teams" of lawyers will take school districts to court to force the issue. Robertson now has over 100 lawyers ready to go on the offensive.

The religious right emerged from the 1993 elections as a potent force in Virginia politics. Though one of their own was defeated in the race for Lt. Governor, religious right backed candidates for Governor and Attorney General won with bit margins. And while movement leaders work to stack state positions, the rank and file are rallying to launch Oliver North's campaign for the Senate next year.

In Jackson Mississippi, a high school principal has enlisted Don Wildmon's American Family Association legal team to force prayer back into the classroom. The principal was dismissed for refusing to comply with the law, and reading prayers over the p.a. system.

Several religious right groups have stepped up minority recruitment efforts. Virtually all of the major organizations have launched outreach programs that play on "culture war" issues. With Christian Coalition prodding, gays and lesbians are being pitted against African-American ministers. The Christian Coalition is also planning a minority membership recruitment drive using advertisements aired on targeted radio stations and mailings to the rented membership lists of minority churches.

The push to take over public school boards continues. In 1994, the majority of states will hold school board elections, elections California, Florida, Texas and Wisconsin. The "Christianization" of these posts remains the number one priority.

In 1991, Paul Weyrich's Free Congress Foundation launched National Empowerment Television, a closed-circuit satellite program beamed to local and state "pro-family" activists. The network's purpose: to coordinate Right Wing grassroots activity on a variety of issues. With 130 NET affiliates now on-line, Free Congress is expanding to provide a 24 hour cable service with round-the-clock propaganda about movement issues and activities.

Efforts are still under way to institute school voucher programs in a number of states, with special emphasis on Arizona, Florida, Illinois, Kansas, Michigan, Georgia, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin. If successful, millions of taxpayer dollars will be directed out of the public schools and into new sectarian academies.


Why all the hostility? Simple, it's how we view you. Ve don't see boomers as the youth movement of the 60's who helped to bring



After I finally fall into a fitful sleep, I still awake once or twice, and think about getting up and putting a stop to this psycho-active nonsense, but I haven't the strength, so I drift off to dream that scene from "Shenadoah" again and again, fully aware of the fact that I am dreaming, and therefore not truly asleep.

Could I operate heavy machinery in this state? Could I act responsibly while driving a car, or piloting a Boeing 727?

Meanwhile, because hemp poses such a threat to the oil industry, we cannot use marijuana legally to treat symptoms of certain diseases, despite evidence that people have used it effectively for the past 5,000 years to treat glaucoma, migraine headaches, multiple sclerosis, and so on and on through the alphabet of illness. ## **Modernization Revisited**

The Zapatista rebellion in Mexico offers a potent reminder of the price of modernization. Beginning in the 1940's the Rockefeller Foundation began underwriting a "green revolution" in industrializing nations, exporting the U.S. model of agricultural production. The results of these policies in Mexico were indeed revolutionary: corn production increased from 1.6 million tons in 1940 to 14.1 million in 1985 and bean production rose from 97,000 to 1.5 million tons over the same period. However, this "great leap forward" in crop yields was accomplished through a concomitant and environmentally destructive rise in the use of chemicals (fertilizer use increased 600%), petroleum-dependent mechanization (tractor use rose 38,000%!) and massive deforestation. All of which was channeled through a burgeoning corporate agribusiness sector that displaced what historian David Sonnenfeld has described as "natural local economies of...communal rain-fed subsistence farming," a Mexican "enclosure" of massive proportions.

In the 1960's and 1970's the market dictates of the "new international division of labor" shifted agricultural production in Mexico from domestic to export crops (primarily beef), forcing Mexico to import staples such as beans, corn and wheat. Left was a displaced rural population incapable of feeding itself and divorced from the land from which their culture was based. People who were once able to feed and clothe themselves in sustainable economic and environmental relationships were left landless and impoverished.

The social and environmental degradation left in the wake of the "green revolution in Mexico was not accidental, it was (and is) the objective of U.S. policy to colonize autonomous pockets of economic exchange in the name of international markets. We are incapable of understanding that people can and do lead meaningful and bountiful lives while remaining entirely outside the realm of commodity production.

Indigenous people and the land they inhabit are intricately linked and, consequently, so are their fates. From the northern reaches of Quebec through the Black Hills to the forests of Chiapas the fragile thread upon which the survival of native people and their land hangs is frayed daily by the ever-expanding reach of market forces (read: NAFTA). It is our responsibility to keep that thread from unraveling entirely.

# Save A Life, Save

Whoever saves one life saves the world entire; whoever takes one life destroys the world entire.

With Schindler's List, Steven Spielberg effectually seized Hollywood's Glitterati by the lapels and declared himself to be a force with whom it must reckon -- and respectfully, too. Make no mistake: Schindler's List constitutes a remarkable achievement. A mainstream film that implicitly assumes mass audiences to be intelligent, capable of discernment on matters artistic. Perhaps most importantly, Spielberg seems to think his audience willing to listen to those who bear witness on crimes against humanity, even as they testify to the courage of those who refused to stand by and nothing.

### Well, somebody had to play the hero

Oskar Schindler was such a man, though Thomas Keneally's book, also called *Schindler's List*, represents Schindler as a deliberate and conscious hero, a war profiteer who fully intended, from the very start of his Nazisponsored enterprises, to save the lives of as many of his slave laborers as possible.

Conversely, Spielberg's film depicts Schindler's courage as something nascent, emanating from the man's fundamental decency, a decency belied by his elbow-bending, womanizing, party-party-party lifestyle. Gradually, through the course of a three and a half hour cinematic narrative that intermixes historical spectacle and intense personal dramas with remarkable ease, we see Oskar Schindler's moral courage and basic decency take root in the barren soil of Nazioccupied Poland, struggle above the ground, Finally, against daunting odds, that tree grows to a vigorous, sheltering tree.

Toward the end of the film (if you haven't seen Schindler's List yet, you may want to skip this to stop reading here), after Germany's surrender, and just before Schindler and his long-suffering wife, Emilie, flee the advancing Russian troops, the surviving prisoners present him with a gold ring (made from the melted down gold bridge provided by an obliging prisoner). His ring's inscription quotes a passage from the Talmud, the rabbinical commentaries on the Hebrew Bible: "Whoever saves one life saves the world entire."

Spielberg's version of *Schindler's List* forced me, along with the Movers and Shakers of The Film Industry, to accept Spielberg as A Serious Director (though personally, I don't think I can ever quite forgive him for the travesty he made of Alice Walker's *The Color Purple*). Unquestionably, this movie triggers extraordinary and perhaps even long-lasting emotional effects in its audience -- what psychologists call a Significant Emotional Experience.

As we sat in Chili's bar, afterwards, waiting for a table, I told Jean --. with some chagrin -- that I was absolutely *ravenous*. "Life," she smiled. Yes. She's right. Life. Ever since then, my *joie de vive* seems to be steadily rising to new levels, and that, I think, I must partly credit to seeing *Schindler's List*. (Well, it is Spring, and I am teaching poetry to earnest undergraduate English majors, nonetheless . . . )

### My drive with Judy

Over the holidays, last December, I had gone to Ohio to visit with friends and family in both Columbus and Cleveland, where I'd grown up and gone to college. While in Cleveland, I had stayed with an old friend from college, who'd stayed on after graduation, pursued a career in marketing, married, had a couple of kids, went back to school for her master's degree in Jewish Education, and now pursues a different career as an educational administrator.

Over the years I've seen Judy and her husband, Rick, who is also Jewish, embrace their Jewish heritage and spirituality with increasing ardor and. While they had always observed Passover, held a *Bris* (ritual circumcision) for their son, and a naming ceremony for their daughter, it's only in the last few years that they've become more observant -- joining a Temple, marking Friday nights as *Shabbat*, and so on.

We've remained as close as any two people can when they live 750 miles or so apart, sharing hilarity, commiserating over each other's crises, and always discussing Things That Matter. During my visit with them last December, Judy and Rick had decided to take pack up their kids and spend the weekend in Columbus. Since I was headed back there, anyway, to resume visiting with my sister Carolyn and her family, we decided to drive to Columbus in tandem. Rick, bless him, drove on ahead with their children, while Judy rode with me.

Judy and I don't get many chances to talk uninterruptedly for three hours, the length of time it takes to drive from Cleveland to Columbus, so we made the most of it. For a moment during those three hours, time seemed to reverse itself. We weren't pushing the speed limit, trying to keep up with Rick, straining my battered Toyota Tercel almost beyond its limits. Instead, we were back in college, eating pizza at Mama Santa's (our favorite off-campus hangout) in Cleveland's Little Italy, earnestly assessing the State of The World. With the arrogance of extreme youth, we had once been righteously confident that we would blaze forth across the skies of history, and set the world right.

If it is true that the world resides wholly within each and every individual human life, then perhaps we can do the work of world salvation a life at a time.

### Those who cannot recall the lessons of history $\dots$

As we drove on, I mentioned that I wanted to see some of the new spate of movies released over the holidays -- The Piano, Philadelphia, Schindler's List, and Six Degrees of Separation among them. Understandably, Judy said she was not eager to see Schindler's List. Perhaps not surprisingly, our conversation had turned to the horrific situation in Bosnia-Herzegovina, and I kept stressing the enormity of it all -- so many people injured, brutalized, dead. Genocide. How many times have we seen that repeated -- before and after World War II. Cambodia under Pol Pot, transformed into the Killing Fields of the Khmer Rouge; Somalia and ; is the Sudan, their cities and villages ravaged by civil conflict, their peoples decimated by deliberately induced famine as a strategy of war; Bosnian Serbs, perhaps taking their cue from the Pakistanis during their war with Bangladesh, using rape as a form of genocide against the Bosnian Muslims (Apparently, the Bosnian Serbs reason that if the raped women become pregnant as a result of their violation(s), their men will repudiate them as unclean. The Pakistanis used the same logic in Bangladesh. Without their women, they'd no longer be a people. ); the forced relocation of Native

American peoples from their traditional homelands, in the 1890's -- who died in vast numbers as they walked the Trail of Tears from the Florida coast to the arid reservations of the Southwest.

Denying genocide cannot be said to be the exclusive province of neo-Nazis and other Holocaust revisionists — to this day, for example, the Turkish government refuses to admit to the campaign of genocide carried out against ethnic Armenians living within its borders. And I was well into my twenties before I learned about the Trail of Tears. None of my earlier history textbooks gave a whisper of acknowledgement. Nearly eighty years after the fact, they still repudiate the evidence of survivors' accounts, ignoring the mass graves and piles of skulls that stand in mute witness in the Turkish deserts.

The enormity of it all, I said, so many people, the enormity. At that point, Judy quoted that passage from the Talmud for me, the whole passage, and not just the first phrase cited in Schindler's List: "Whoever saves one life saves the world entire; whoever takes one life destroys the world entire." In the Judaic tradition, she told me, one does not make a distinction between the murder of one person and the murder of millions. Each human life, in and of itself, weighs beyond measure; monstrous inhumanity cannot be reckoned cumulatively. The horror of taking a single life, the Talmud's rabbinic commentators emphasize, moves the perpetrator beyond barbarism.

But most of us will very likely not find ourselves in extraordinary circumstances, as did Oskar Schindler. Most of us would be loathe, under ordinary conditions to sacrifice our personal ambitions, goals, and dreams -- for eminently good reasons. That is not to disparage, however, the heroism of people like Oskar Schindler. Nor should we fail to continue to wonder that courage and decency can come from someone so unlikely, a man who was not a saint, not a martyr, not even an idealist. Where would our measures compare to such heroic stature? Should we join Mother Theresa in Calcutta, ministering to the lepers? Or join the international Red Cross, and do relief work in Bosnia-Herzegovina, or Somalia, or the Sudan?

### We need a Marshall Plan for our own country

Or for that matter, should we all do community service work in our own inner cities, desolate as downtown Beirut, where the leading cause of death among young men of color is homicide. (That is, if they have not already been run to ground by the hounds of poverty and rage and despair.) What of our young women, of all colors, equally ground under by conditions of poverty and absence of opportunity? Barely pubescent themselves, they frequently have their first babies at the age of 16, or 14, or 12, or even 10, because they believe that having babies will be, the only good they can accomplish, their only positive legacy.

If it is true that the world resides wholly within each and every individual human life, then perhaps we can also do the work of world salvation a life at a time, whether we commit ourselves to heroic labor abroad or within our own country. And we do not necessarily have to leave home behind us to do it, either.

Recently, I have witnessed a remarkable humanitarian act, a gesture of nobility and courage as grand as I am ever likely to see. My niece, Donna, and her husband, Tom, have recently taken legal guardianship of one of Tom's nephews, Nick, who's 13.

### Life imitates television

Donna and Tom, who are both in their late twenties, live a lifestyle that would be absolutely familiar to the central characters of ABC's 'Roseanne." As far from yuppiedom as the Connors, they own a modest home, have a small son, and live very modestly. Tom works as a security guard for a large university hospital in a fairly tough neighborhood. For now Donna stays at home, though she plans to work with Tom in a small business that they will literally run out of their garage. Like Dan and Roseanne, they are, I'm sure, sometimes ill-tempered and unfair with each other, as well as with Matthew, their little boy. But also like the Connors, they meet life's challenges with humor and dignity and a firm set of values. They too are always there for each other, as well as for both Matthew and Nick.

If you watch "Roseanne" regularly, as I do, you'll recall that the Connors had taken in their daughter's boyfriend, David, who was poised to run away from home rather than endure another day of his abusive mother's verbal and emotional battering. Nick, Tom's nephew, had been in a similar situation, though it had been his stepfather, and not his mother, who'd been abusing him. Nevertheless, the writers of "Roseanne" could easily have used Nick's home life as a model for David's. Apparently, Nick's untenable situation had also been a longstanding one. I can remember conversations with Donna and Tom, from several years back, wondering what, if anything, they could or should do. Even then, they talked about taking on his legal guardianship. Finally, just over last Christmas, they decided to act.

They did not act impulsively. They consulted an attorney, researched the social welfare system, talked it over at length with each other and my sister and her husband, Donna's parents. After a particularly nasty episode around Christmas, when Nick and his mother had been visiting with other relatives, Donna and Tom approached Karen about taking legal guardianship. A few days later, Nick landed on their doorstep, along with his mother's signed consent on the necessary court documents.

### Repeat after me: I am somebody

The subsequent changes in Nick's life have been immediate and dramatic. Donna and Tom encourage him to work harder in school at subjects, such as science, which give him some trouble, and urge him to use the computer to do his English homework, a subject at which he does quite well. (The computer's real attraction, I suspect, has more to do with interactive computer games. Anything to hone those eyehand coordination skills.) He has his own room. He has decent clothes to wear to school. For the first time in his life, he's going to a dentist on a regular basis. He has someone who makes sure he does his homework, picks up his room, and is back at home when he's supposed to be. Most importantly, he has two people who let him know through their every interaction that they love each other, that they love their son, and that they love him.

Why should he have tried to work hard in school, when his stepfather unrelentingly insisted that he was stupid and worthless and wouldn't amount to anything anyway? Why should he have had goals and ambitions, when he was continually told he'd only screw-up, fall flat on his face, and probably spend most of his later life in prison?

Donna's and Tom's intervention probably came just in time for Nick. In another year or two, if the situation had continued, Nick could very well have ended up in Juvenile Hall, as a criminal and/or incorrigible minor, where'd he'd probably have ended up prepping for a career as an adult criminal. God only knows what might have become of him then, let alone how long he may have survived. As my father said, after he heard about Donna and Tom taking in Nick, "Maybe this will be one more kid who won't wind up in jail."

Nick's aunt and uncle understand full well the tremendous financial and emotional burden they've accepted by taking in a 13 year old boy. He grows another foot every two weeks, needs orthodontic triage, and, most wrenchingly, he must recognize, sooner or later, that his mother, who, for all her mistakes, poor choices, and hard, sad life, most certainly loves him, but yet she chose an abusive, alcoholic creep of a husband over him.

### And people say a good man is hard to find...

Fortunately, Nick worships his uncle Tom, who is not one to take any crap from some kid, and perhaps Tom will make him feel that at long last, he's found a man he can talk to. Additionally, his Aunt Donna's clear-eyed refusal to try to be his mother, but yet remain his friend and guardian, could make the balance of difference for him. With them, Nick should see that there are far better, and not just different ways to live. Money need not be a determining factor. Tom's family is large, and many of his other relatives are far better off financially. Everyone agreed that something had to be done for Nick, yet he and Donna were the ones who cared enough about him to ask him to come live with them. (The exception would be one of Tom's sisters, who has a young son with serious psychiatric problems. There's no question she's got more than she can handle already.) They said, in effect, "Nick, your life is too precious to toss away in the landfill of neglect and abuse, pointless rebellion and tragic self-destruction."

For now, it seems to be going well, and Nick has been minding his p's and q's, because he does not want to go back to his mother and stepfather. What kind of man he becomes will be very much up to him, for his aunt and uncle remind him -- daily if only implicitly -- that he must accept responsibility for the choices he makes. Being held accountable for his actions by people who care about him may give Nick something he probably would never otherwise have had -- a chance in life.

Donna and Tom have engaged in an humanitarian effort as worthy and significant as

anything Oskar Schindler had done, and theirs too will necessarily be an ongoing act, one lived day by day. Anyone might be moved to heroism and decency on impulse -- to plunge into a burning house to save a child; to throw yourself bodily over someone being beaten on the street, and tell his/her attackers that if they want to continue, they'll have to beat you as well. If we hesitate at such moments, we may or may not act, and if we don't, live with terrible guilt. I myself know from bitter, shameful memory that I could never forgive myself if I didn't at least try, the next time, to help.

### Spielberg got his Oscar, but all we got was *kudos* from my aunt, the advocacy journalist

It takes a very different sort of courage to weigh the possible consequences to you and yours, and then go ahead and intervene and stay on course, to choose pursue your course of rescue as a daily task, and at great personal risk. While Donna and Tom are not literally risking their lives in taking in Nick, they are risking a very great deal. Who knows what the long-range impact of their intervention will be on their lives?

Oskar Schindler died a lonely, impoverished alcoholic, and both Keneally and Spielberg represent him as haunted by guilt, always tormented by his private demons' insistence that he could have saved more people, had he only tried harder. No doubt, Donna and Tom will make mistakes with Nick, just as they will their own son. Quite possibly, in retrospect -- no matter how well things may turn out -- they may regret not having acted sooner, regret not sparing Nick a few more years of grief and pain. In the final climax of Schindler's List, when the about-to-be-liberated prisoners present Schindler with his ring, and explain the significance of the inscription, he breaks down, begging their forgiveness for not having done more, for not having saved more people.

Both Keneally's and Spielberg's epilogues, for the book and film versions, respectively, of *Schindler's List* note that Oskar Schindler was directly responsible for saving 1,100 hundred people, and that the descendants of these survivors number 6,000. Nick's descendants would probably number less than twenty people over three generations. He could, of course, have descendants, even if did he end up in the slammer. But because of Donna and Tom, he may pass along a legacy every bit as meaningful as that of those on Schindler's List.

Donna and Tom stand shoulder to shoulder with people like Oskar Schindler, who refused to stand by and do nothing while the world was being destroyed. They too refused to behave like good Germans, not actively persecuting anyone, but not lifting a finger to stop persecution either. I fervently wish for them that, no matter what happens, they face down the Furies of doubt and regret. They too are fighting for an absolute good They have saved the world from all-butcertain destruction. The world that is Nick.

### Camp Sister Spirit needs you

The feminist retreat Camp Sister Spirit continues to be the target of anti-lesbian harassment and intimidation in the small town of Ovett, Mississippi.

Wanda Henson, a native Mississippian, and her partner, Brenda Henson, a long-time resident of the state, bought a 120 acre farm in July to establish a retreat and educational center for individuals and groups battling sexism, homophobia, racism, illiteracy, domestic violence, and more. Sister Spirit, Inc., has provided a food bank, clothing distribution, counseling, and referrals, among other services, in Gulfport, Mississippi for several years.

One Ovett resident, J. D. Hendry, in conjunction with Baptist ministers from around the area, organized two hate-filled town meetings to condemn the women and scheme ways to oust the women from the town. Meanwhile, the retreat and the Hensons both have received numerous threats. A dead dog was draped over their mailbox in November, armed men have been found trespassing on the land, a telephone death threat was received on Christmas Eve, a bomb threat was sent by mail, signs and rainbow flags marking the property have been repeatedly stolen, and most women who live or visit the property are harassed and threatened by Ovett residents at the general store. Hendry and others continue to insist that they will drive the women and Camp Sister Spirit from town.

### Demand an end to discrimination

The federal civil rights bill banning discrimination based on sexual orientation, H. R. 431, will have been reintroduced this last February to the House of Representatives.

While the bill number has been held since last session, the actual bill was not introduced because drafting the new bill had not been completed. The bill has not yet been introduced in the Senate.

### Contact the Department of Justice

NGLTF has asked the federal government to intervene in the situation in Ovett, MS to ensure the safety and rights of the Hensons. [See "Camp Sister Spirit needs you," in this issue of the *Post Amerikan*]

In December, NGLTF sent a letter to Attorney General Janet Reno requesting specific action from the Department of Justice (DOJ). To date, the DOJ's Community Relations Service (CRS) has contacted the Hensons and local law enforcement officials; the FBI has launched a criminal investigation, because a threat was sent to the Hensons through the U. S. Mail, and DOJ officials met with NGLTF staffers to discuss the situation.

However, the Attorney General has not yet formally responded to the NGLTF request for intervention, and CRS officials say they cannot directly intervene and mediate, because sexual orientation is included neither in the the agency's mandate nor in federal civil rights laws.

Urge Attorney General Janet Reno to direct the CRS to mediate the situation. Also ask her to condemn the intimidation, harassment, and violence aimed at the Hensons and denounce all acts of anti-gay harassment and violence.

### A questionable policy

First Interstate BankCorp last month removed sexual orientation from its non-discrimination policy, saying the deletion was meant to create "uniformity" with civil rights laws that vary from state to state. NGLTF has launched a campaign to encourage the company to revert back to its original policy.

First Interstate customers are especially encouraged to send letters opposing the deletion of sexual orientation from the non-discrimination policy.

### **Congressional Action**

The Hate Crime Statistics Act is due for reauthorization this year. The federal law, passed in 1990, authorizes the FBI to count crimes based on bias, including prejudice based on a victim's real or perceived sexual orientation.

Urge Congressional leaders to reauthorize the legislation.

### Condom ads backlash

Twelve years into the AIDS epidemic, the federal government has launched a national media campaign promoting the use of condoms as effective in the prevention of spreading HIV. While none of the ads feature explicitly gay characters, the Right Wing has labelled them "offensive" simply because the ads advocate condom usage.

Both the major television networks and congress are targets of this Right Wing backlash. Only the Fox Television Network is airing the ads without a tag line promoting abstinence and is not giving the ads only late-night time slots. AIDS Action Council has launched a campaign to encourage presentation of the ads.

Demand that your congressional representatives oppose attempts to restrict the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and other federal agencies from sponsoring HIV prevention programs that promote the use of condoms as an effective way to prevent HIV infection.

NGLTF angered by First Interstate Bank's removal of sexual orientation from non-discrimination policy

San Francisco -- The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) has notified First Interstate BankCorp that its current removal of sexual orientation from the corporation;s non-discrimination policy is considered hostile to gay, lesbian, and bisexual people. NGLTF announced February 3, 1994, that its Workplace Organizing Project will begin a campaign to encourage the company to revert back to its original policy. (See sidebar, "A questionable policy")

## **Are Condoms Really Effective?**

As a result of the highly-publicized new condom ad campaign sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), there should be even more public attention on condoms this year.

But opinions of condoms and condom use aren't always positive. Some groups have recently been circulating information aimed at discrediting condoms, in an effort to dissuade teenagers from considering sexual activity. The information is not credible, and the strategy could have some serious negative consequences.

A recent CDC publication, the Morbidity and Mortality Report: The Effectiveness of Condoms, offers compelling scientific evidence that condoms, when used correctly, are a very effective means of preventing disease transmission. The report refutes claims that condoms have sizable holes, that they frequently break and often fail.

Such myths discourage sexually active couples-couples of all ages, not just teens--from using condoms. Quoting the report, "We know that one of the key determinants of condom use is the belief that condoms work...sexually active individuals will be less motivated to use condoms if they don't belive that they will be effective barriers. Therefore, it is important that sexually active individuals get the message that latex condoms provide effective protection from HIV if they are used correctly and consistently."

Recent data from Switzerland demonstrates that a condom promotion campaign can be effective without affecting the level of sexual activity among teenagers. Bloomington's Protection Connection encourages condom use among sexually active individuals by providing a comfortable atmosphere in which to shop for condoms, offering a wide selection of condoms, and giving customers information on condom use and effectiveness.

Exposing condoms to direct sunlight or heat, can weaken the latex and causes breakage.

Consistent use of condoms means using a condom from start to finish with **every** act of intercourse. Correct use means leaving space at the tip of the condom, withdrawing immediately after ejaculation, and holding the rim during withdrawal.

More than a quarter of the people in the United States will contract a sexually transmitted disease (STD) at some point in their life.

## **Condom Facts**

Did you know?

Condoms are very effective at preventing HIV transmission, when used correctly and consistently. Of 123 couples studied from 1987 to 1991, in which one of the partners was HIV infected and they consistently used condoms, none of their partners became infected. Among 122 couples who inconsistently used condoms, 10% (12 of 122) became infected.

About half of all condoms purchased nationwide are bought by women.

Every condom sold in the U.S. is electronically tested for defects, including holes and areas of thinning, before it is packaged.

Men should not wear condoms that are too small or too tight - they are more likely to unroll or break. Larger-sized condoms are available.

The quality of latex condoms is higher than that of latex gloves. Condoms are double-dipped in latex while gloves are only single-dipped.

A national survey of heterosexual adults with multiple sex partners found only 17% used condoms all of the time.

Female condoms are now available. They are not as effective as male condoms, but are good for women whose partners refuse to wear male condoms.

Latex condoms provide better protection from HIV than natural membrane ("sheepskin") condoms.

Most condom breakage is due to user error, and is preventable:

Oil based lubricating products can weaken the latex and cause condoms to break.
